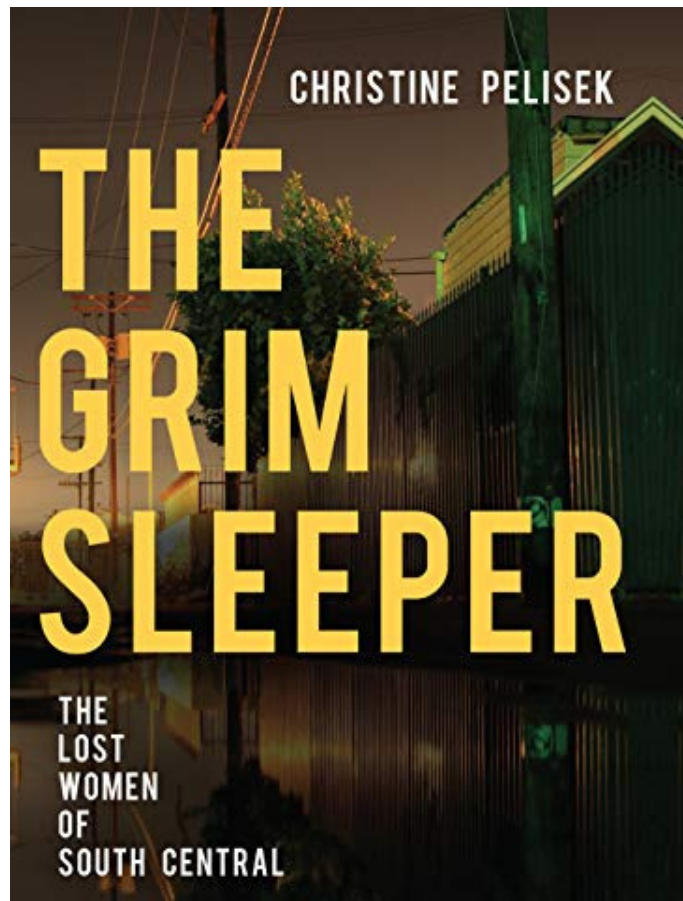
CHRISTINE PELISEK

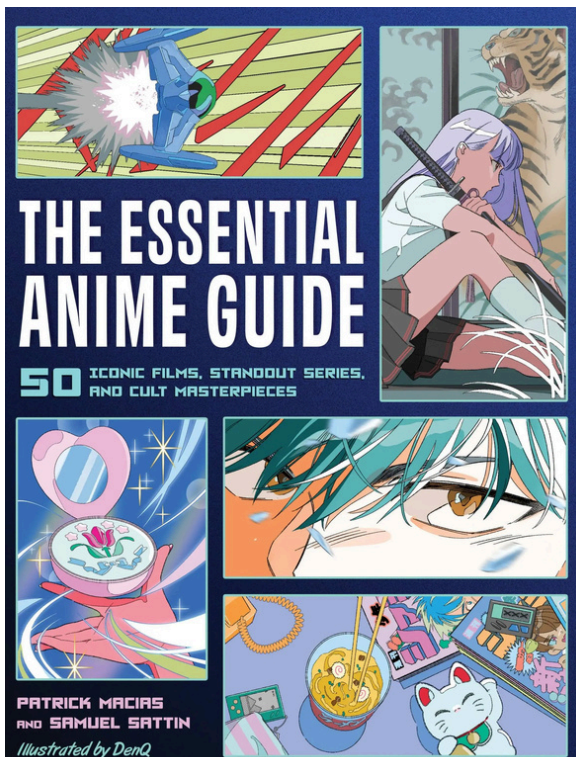
